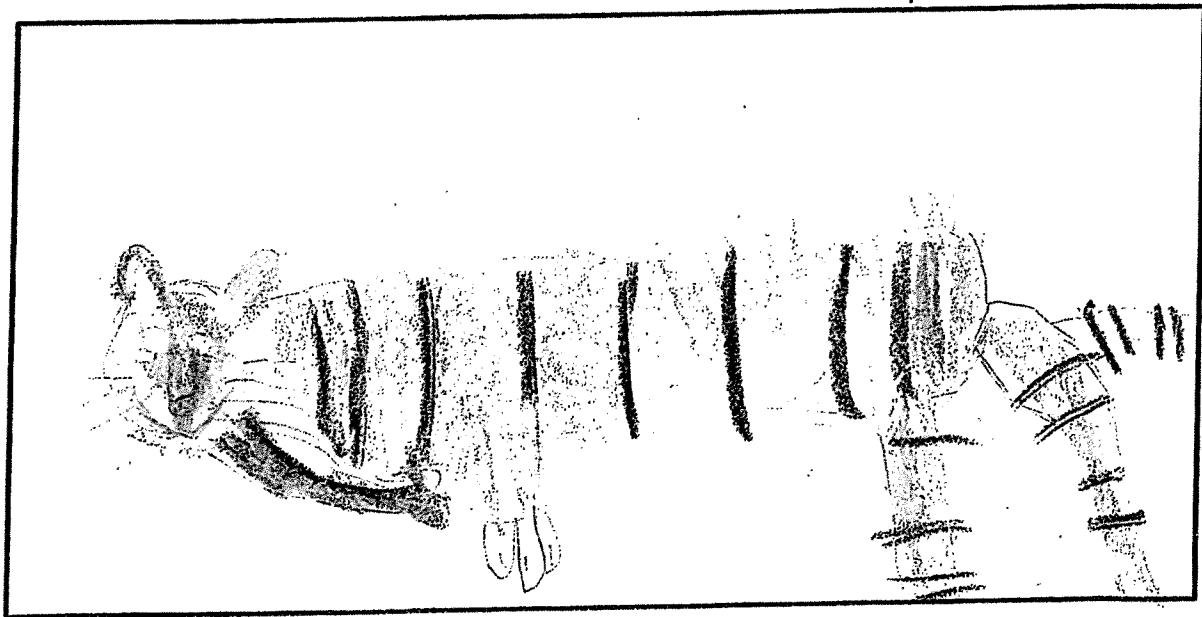

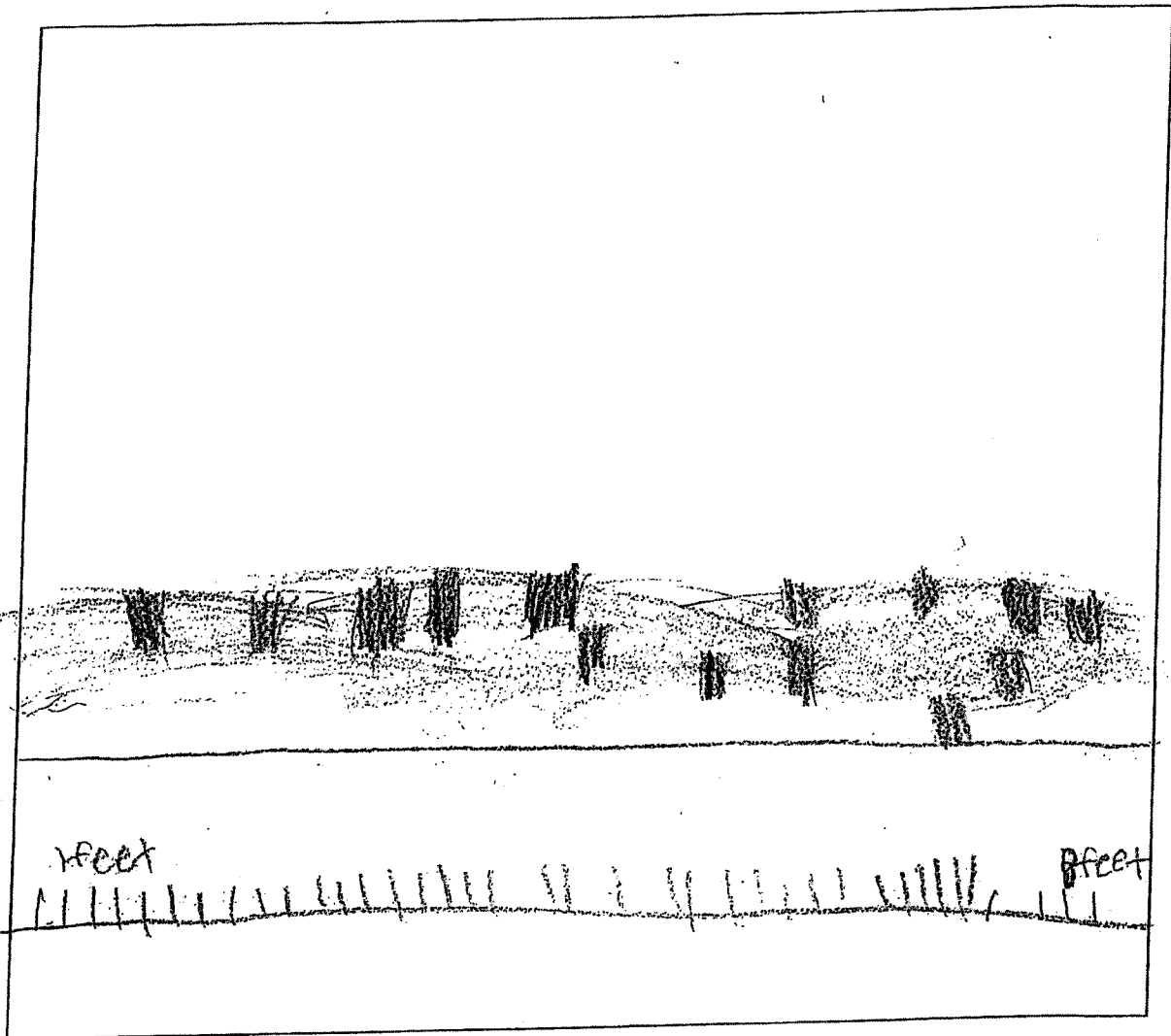

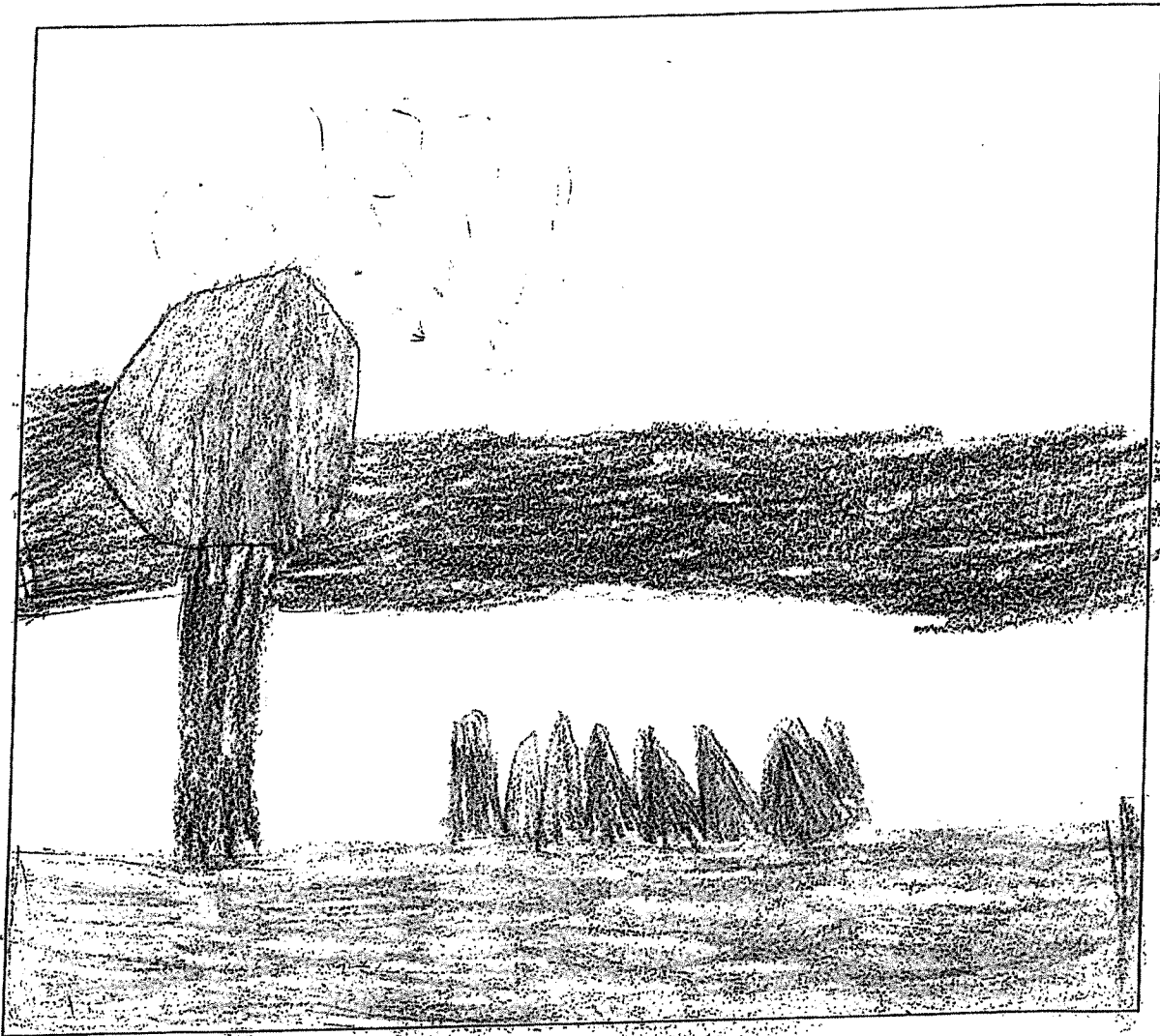
Diet
